Industry News

Industry Technical Council Update: *Canadian Electrical Code 22nd Edition in Effect.* Order-In-Council signed that amends the Electrical Code Regulation to adopt the 2012 Canadian Electrical Code, 22nd edition; the 2012 Code for Electrical Installations for Oil and Gas, 4th edition; and the 2013 Alberta Electrical Utility Code, 4th edition. **All three codes come into force or become law as of October 1, 2013.**

ULC Approvals of Fire-Rated cables has been re-instated with related information and approvals listed on the Alberta Municipal Affairs website under "Safety Codes - Electrical - Advisories".

CEC Section 32 regarding circuit feeding fire alarm panels. Electricians and Safety Codes Officers (SCO's) are interpreting the over current device must be installed in the closest panel board to the main service. In very large buildings this can be very difficult. The code states "as close as practicable" which allows for alternate panel boards in these cases. The current STANDATA will be re-drafted to clarify this situation. **Code books available through the ECAA office and your local Chapter meetings.**

Expanding the Registered Apprenticeship Program The new Education Act (2015) will provide for an extended opportunity for high school youth to experience career exploration in Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP). The high school age changing from 19 to 21 in the 2015 - 2016 school year. On a trial basis, CAREERS introduced a pilot project in the Edmonton area during summer 2013. The pilot project enables a graduating high school student to enroll in RAP for the summer, with a committed employer, and continue their schooling in RAP for an extended period the next year with the same employer. Meaning the classroom is the employer worksite. Some key benefits may include: attraction to employers with 18 year old policies for engagement on the worksite; provision of multiple entry points for students in high school, thus increased flexibility in academic and CTS credentials, more students entering RAP, and potential to assist schools and students with high school completion rates.

The **Occupational Health & Safety (OHS) Amendment Regulation has passed and the changes to the OHS Regulation will take effect October 1, 2013.** The OHS Regulation had undergone review as it was set to expire on September 30, 2013. The OHS Regulation specifies requirements on administrative matters such as availability of critical documents on worksite, worker training, worker certification requirements etc. After the comprehensive review and consultation, the OHS Regulation is revised and renewed. Labour Update

Updated List of Benefits available for unionized contractors from the Electrical Contractors Industry Fund. *The Fund is supported by contributions from contractors signed to a collective agreement with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.*

Canadian Welding Bureau (CWB) - Certification

The initial CWB certification test and subsequent recertification test cost is reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund. Certification is valid for two years. The

CWB AWS D1.3 for sheet metal (unistrut welding) test cost is also reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund.

For additional information see the applicable article in the Collective Agreement.

Audiometric Testing

Alberta OH&S legislation requires that employers working in the industrial field have all new employees audiometric tested within the first six months of their employment, twelve months after the initial test and every two years thereafter, unless there are indications that more frequent testing is required. The ECAA has contracted a third party to conduct required audiometric testing. ECAA Industry Fund covers the third party costs.

The Industrial Construction Crew Supervisor (ICCS)

ICCS is a Designated Occupation certification that can be obtained under the Alberta Apprenticeship and Industry Training Act. Application and Testing cost is reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund. For more information on the ICCS go to tradesecrets.gov.ab.ca

Better SuperVision (BSV)

BSV is a management skills training program that provides skills training on Leadership and SuperVision, Labour Relations, Planning and Scheduling, Productivity and Quality and Leading Effective Work Teams. Tuition cost is reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund. For information go to bettersupervision.org

Leadership for Safety Excellence (LSE)

LSE is a supervisory safety skills training program offered through the Alberta Construction Safety Association. Tuition cost is reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund.

First Level Supervisor Training Program (FLST)

FLST, an e learning supervisory training program through BuildForce Canada (formerly Construction Sector Council), E Learning Center. Tuition cost is reimbursed by the ECAA Industry Fund.

Rapid Site Access Program (RSAP) Case Managed Aftercare (as contained in applicable collective agreement)

Union members not currently a beneficiary of the Health Plan request/require a Substance Abuse Expert Assessment: member agrees to become an RSAP Participant and be case managed by third party manager Organizational Health Inc; OHI manages; ECAA Industry Fund covers OHI cost. (Note: For Bargaining Unit employees referred to OHI by an RSAP Contractor, RSAP contributions cover OHI costs).

English Benchmarking

When an individual's English skills to work safely are questionable and the employer requires the individual to take the standard Canadian Language Benchmarks test and the individual does not meet the benchmark the employer may be reimbursed for the individual's wages for the time taken to be tested.

EFAP Benefits for Non Plan Members

Employee and Family Assistance Program benefits will be provided to Electrical Industry Insurance Benefit Trust Fund of Alberta Non Plan Members and their dependents from the Electrical Contractors Industry Fund provided such Non Plan Members are must be working for a union employer and have union clearance issued by Local 424 IBEW to work for the union employer.

Labour Relations Support

The ECAA Industry Fund provides support for resolving grievances, coordinating collective agreement negotiations, Membership Development Fund Applications, collective agreement interpretation and application, etc..

Professional Electrical Contractor (PEC) News

From the Desk of the PEC Education Chair

I recently attended the International Association of Electrical Inspectors (IAEI) conference hosted in Saskatoon by the Prairie Chapter of the IAEI. I sat in on three excellent technical presentations, all of which delved into topics of interest to electrical contractors.

Ark Tsisserev, a principal of Stantec Engineering, gave a presentation on Section 24 of the CEC, Patient Care Areas. He provided insight into how the three areas (basic, intermediate and critical) of a health care facility are classified based on what procedures take place within the areas. Ark also spoke about emergency power supplies for health care facilities as well as CSA Z32, a standard for electrical installations in health-care facilities that is referenced many times in the Appendix B notes of Section 24 of the CEC. One important function of the Z32 standard is to subdivide healthcare facilities into classes A, B and C based on what procedures are performed in the facility.

Randy Hunter of Bussmann (Eaton) gave a presentation on selective co-ordination of overcurrent devices. The essence of this presentation was that if a short circuit occurs in a branch circuit it is desirable to have the overcurrent device for that branch circuit trip before an upstream o/c device trips causing power outages in other circuits. Accomplishing this is often a challenge when branch circuits are fed from circuit breakers in a panelboard and the panelboard is protected by upstream fuses. To mitigate this problem some manufacturers have introduced panelboards which contain fuses instead of breakers to protect branch circuits. The final presentation was given by Pablo Diaz on the topic of grounding. Specifically, he spoke about grounding problems and the complexities of troubleshooting the problems. According to Pablo there is a high incidence of incorrect installations of grounding and bonding conductors. One common problem he runs across is where the neutral conductor is not isolated from ground downstream of the service box. This situation leads to parallel neutrals which allows current to flow on the bonding path which is often a metallic conduit. During his presentation Pablo discussed troubleshooting grounding problems in large installations such as a refinery and how it can take days of troubleshooting to find the problem.
